

Whole lotta shaking going on!

As we have recently been reminded – **EARTHQUAKES WILL HAPPEN!** And whether or not an earthquake becomes a disaster boils down to one word: **preparation**.

If You're Inside, Stay Inside

First things first: if you feel an earthquake, resist the urge to run outside. Here in California, modern buildings are designed to withstand large earthquakes, but windows can shatter onto the street below, and exterior masonry may fall off as well. What if you're outside? In that case, get away from trees and power lines as well as buildings (which likely won't fall but may drop debris on you). If you can shelter in place, do so.

Drop, Cover, and Hold On

The best way to shelter in place is to drop, cover, and hold on. When the quake starts, drop to the floor as soon as you can. If a table or other form of cover is nearby, then move quickly (crawling works) to get underneath it. Finally, crouch in position, with one arm over your neck and head, and another holding on to the table leg.

Text Don't Call

After the earthquake, it's natural to want to reach out to friends and family. Keep in mind that a text will have a better chance of getting through than a phone call, which is more likely to experience network congestion. Everyone will be safer if you limit your calls after an earthquake. Likewise,

don't call 911 unless you're experiencing a true emergency. Unless someone is hurt, leave that system open for first responders to get to the injured as quickly as possible.

Easy Ways to Prepare

- Keep a flashlight and a pair of shoes next to your bed. This way, if a quake hits in the middle of the night, knocking out power, you'll be able to make your way through a darkened house after the quake.
- Your water supply may be compromised. Keep several gallons of water on hand, just in case. It's also a good idea to have a stock of canned goods—and a manual can opener.
- Keep a folder or binder with copies of important documents in an easily accessible place, so you can literally grab it and go.

How To File A Claim

Fast Facts About Federal Real ID Act Requirements

What is REAL ID?

Beginning October 1, 2020, the federal government will require your driver license or ID card to be **REAL I**D compliant if you wish to use it as identification to board a domestic flight or enter secure federal facilities that require identification. The California DMV now offers federal compliant REAL ID driver licenses or ID cards.

Do I Need a REAL ID?

Starting October 1 2020, you will need a REAL ID or other federally approved identification (passport, military ID) to pass TSA airport checkpoints nationwide or visit secure facilities.

You do not need a REAL ID if:

- you know you will not be boarding a domestic flight or visiting a secure federal facility, such as a military base
- OR will use other approved documents as identification.

If you don't choose a REAL ID, you will receive a Federal Non-Compliant Card with the phrase "Federal Limits Apply." Those under 18 are not required to have a REAL ID to fly.

How to Get a REAL ID:

In order to get a REAL ID you must go to a DMV office and bring proof of:

- 1. Identity
- 2. Social Security number
- 3. California address

NOTE: Name change document is required if the name on your identity document is different than your current legal name.

PLAN AHEAD!

- Make an appointment for your REAL ID visit
- Complete the online driver license/ID card application before you go
- Bring the application fee:
 \$35 for Driver License or
 \$30 for ID Card

REPLACE the hoses on your washing machine, dishwasher, and other appliances periodically. Consider replacing a rubber hose with a steel braided one to increase durability and longevity.

INSPECT your water heater annually for signs of corrosion or leaks. Aging water heaters can weaken over time, increasing their likelihood of rupturing.
